| CARES LET'S DO NET ZERO COMMUNITY BUILDINGS FUND | See guidance | Funding is now available from the Scottish Government's Community and Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES). The fund aims to support community organisations to reduce their building energy costs and carbon emissions. The Let's Do Net Zero Community Buildings Fund is open now and is planned to run until the end of March 2025, subject to funding availability. Funding is available for many types of community building, including: community cafes, community hubs, faith buildings, public halls, community halls and centres. Grant funding is available for up to 80% of eligible costs up to a maximum of £80,000. New guidance now available. |

| BBC CHILDREN IN NEED: EMERGENCY ESSENTIALS REOPENED | | Grants are available to provide critical household items and clothing to support children and young people facing exceptional and difficult circumstances. Applications must be made by a pre-registered referrer. |

| CLIMATE ENGAGEMENT LAB - 2023 OPEN CALL FOR INNOVATION PARTNERSHIP | | Climate Outreach is looking for a new innovation partner organisation to reach and motivate specific audiences in the UK. The <u>Climate Engagement Lab</u> is looking to support an existing project that is engaging people who are concerned about politics and climate change, but aren't generally part of the climate conversation and are deeply and instinctively distrustful that 'elites' will do much to help. Through the partnership, they will provide free support for a group that's engaging working class communities on climate or climate-adjacent (i.e. transport, energy, food) projects. |

| COMMUNITY RIGHT TO BUY FUND | | The Community Right to Buy Fund provides financial support for community organisations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. The fund helps communities pay for professional services to help them register an interest in land or buildings under the Community Right to Buy legislation. These services could include legal title searches or help with mapping. Funding of up to £5,000 is available, to cover up to 80% of the eligible cost. Communities must be prepared to cover the rest of the cost from other sources. This support is unlikely to involve state subsidy, but this will be assessed on a case by case basis. |
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| CORRA FOUNDATION - BOOST SMALL GRANTS | | Boost small grants programme is for organisations supporting children and families in their local communities. It has been created to help groups that find the increases in basic running costs (for example utilities, salaries, transport) are making their work much more challenging. Boost will provide grants of £500-£3,000 to grassroots organisations and charities with a yearly income of up to £50,000 whose work benefits children and families. |

This fund exists to support costs linked to flights, freight, visas and the translation of marketing materials. Other costs are expected to be met by the inviting promoter. |

| CREATIVE | The fund is open all year round – with no deadlines | Grants up to £100,000 over one year are available for charities, organisations and groups involved in the arts, screen and creative industries to adapt, respond and sustain practice. The fund will continue to support organisations to deliver a wide range of creative activity. This includes funding for: • a specific one-off project or production or |

| CYCLING SCOTLAND: CYCLING FRIENDLY GRANTS | - | a period of creative research and development or a longer term programme of work. It can also support organisations to undertake business and organisational development that will: enhance their business sustainability through the development of new or more diverse income streams or consider broader organisational development costs. Eligible organisations can apply for funding between £1k and £100k for projects or programmes lasting up to 18 months. Grants up to £20,000 are available for community groups and voluntary organisations for local projects that will improve cycling facilities and increase the number of people cycling. Other funding programmes are available. |
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| CYCLING TOURISM FACILITIES FUND (HIGHLANDS AND ISLANDS ENTERPRISE) MOVE YOUR CYCLING FACILITIES UP A GEAR | | This fund is for businesses and community enterprises operating in the tourism sector to develop and enhance their cycle tourism facilities. The minimum grant is £5,000 up to a maximum of £25,000 for capital expenditure, which will cover up to 50% of total eligible project costs. Funding can be used towards a variety of capital projects including investing in fixtures, fittings, construction, adaptation, or upgrade of premises to improve cycling tourism facilities. Applications are invited from third sector organisations and community groups to this fund. The fund will open for applications on Monday 28th August 2023 and will close on Friday 26th January 2024. Funded activity must take place between 28th August and 14th February 2024. Grants of up to £300.00 are available on a rolling basis during the fund period and must be used to support conversations, events or gatherings in person or online. Following a highly inclusive process of engagement with communities in 2018, the Democracy Matters Fund has developed into phase two. Phase one showed that different places and diverse communities work best when they have local control and influence over decisions that affect them most. This fund aims to develop the thinking around how a vibrant, equal system of local democracy, where people understand their rights and actively participate in civic life, can be made to work in practice. 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| DEVELOPMENT GRANT FUNDING FOR BUSINESSES AND THIRD SECTOR ORGANISATIONS | n/a | The Shetland Islands Council Economic Development Grant Scheme provides grants of up to £25,000 to businesses and third sector organisations in Shetland. It aims to help organisations with the costs related to developing growth or research projects. |

| FAITH IN COMMUNITY SCOTLAND FAMILY FUND MOBILITY SUPPORT (FFMS) SCHEME | Ongoing n/a | Grants up to £500 are available for any local faith group or related organisation working primarily in a small, specific geographic community to tackle poverty and climate change. Top-up grants are available for mentoring support. The Family Fund has announced £5 million worth of funding for the Mobility Support scheme (FFMS). The fund will provide crucial support to families with a seriously ill or disabled child under three with mobility needs. |
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| FCC SCOTTISH ACTION FUND | 2024-2 Round opens 20 March 2024, closes at 5.00pm on 5 June 2024. 2024-4 Round opens 18 September 2024 closes at 5.00pm on 4 December 2024. | The FCC Scottish Action Fund offers funding to projects through the Scottish Landfill Communities Fund (SLCF). It will consider applications across all types of projects included in the SLCF: Land Reclamation (Object A): The reclamation, remediation, restoration or other operation on land to facilitate economic, social or environmental use. Community Recycling (Object B): Community based recycling, re-use and waste prevention projects. Public Amenities and Parks (Object C): To provide, maintain or improve a public park or other public amenity. | FIT FOR LIFE FOUNDATION: GRANTS FOR PIONEERING HEALTHY AGING INITIATIVES | 15th February 2024 | Every year, the Fit for Life Foundation awards grants of EUR 100,000 each to 3 to 4 non-profit organisations or social enterprises that are pioneering projects to promote healthy ageing around the world. This multi-year support enables Laureates to steadily scale up their programs, while building public awareness of the importance of healthy aging for communities. The mission and activities of the applicant organisation or initiative must directly address healthy ageing for older (65+ years) or middle-aged people (45+ years). They welcome solutions relevant to: physical fitness, mental health, mental well-being, exercise and sport, mobility, nutrition, at-home care, community support for older people, prevention of non-communicable diseases (NCDs), and other forms of preventative health support. | FOUNDATION SCOTLAND - MARY JANET KING FUND | Applications can be submitted at any time and decisions take approximately 10 weeks from receipt of your application. | Grants up to £5,000 are available to for Scottish grassroots and community groups working with young people in arts and music, particularly with activities that encourage the uptake of music. The fund supports piano scholarships at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in Glasgow but also welcomes applications from community groups working with young people in arts and music. They are particularly interested in projects which are helping young people to take up music. Priority will be given to grassroots organisations. |
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| FOYLE FOUNDATION SMALL GRANTS SCHEME | No deadline | The small grants scheme supports smaller UK registered charities with an annual turnover of less than £150,000 a year, especially those working at grassroots and local community level, in any field, across a wide range of activities. One year grants of between £2,000 and £10,000 are made towards core costs, projects, essential equipment or building projects provided charities can demonstrate this makes a significant difference to their work. Priority will be to support local charities still active in their communities which are currently delivering services to the young, vulnerable, elderly, disadvantaged or the general community. Applications take up to four months to process. |
| FRIENDS PROVIDENT FOUNDATION | Monday 15 January 2024 at 5pm | Charities, social enterprises, and private companies can apply for funding for projects and activities that help to create fairness and sustainability in the economy. The funding is being made available through the Foundation's 4D Economy Grants to support the development of new economic approaches based on the four D's: Diversified, Decarbonised, Democratised and Decentralised. They operate a rolling application process, with four review points across the year. |
| FUNDING SUPPORT FOR CLEAN ENERGY TRANSITION | | The Clean Energy Transition Partnership is a competitive funding call that aims to get as many Scottish companies as possible involved in developing new clean energy solutions. There is a 2-stage application process. Scottish Enterprise can only consider projects that have already been selected through the Clean Energy Transition Partnership ranking process. The ranking process is an independent evaluation by a group of international experts. Only the highest-ranking projects will receive funding. There are 10 modules that describe specific topics and/or challenges that applicants should address in their project proposal. Applicants must choose and apply to a specific module in their proposal. |

| GOOGLE AD GRANTS | n/a | Ad Grants provides access to in-kind advertising every month for text ads and you will also get access to tools to help you build effective marketing campaigns. This support can be used to help attract donors, raise awareness for your organisation, and recruit volunteers with in-kind advertising on Google Search. |
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| GRASSROOTS ACTI VITY DEMENTIA FUND | Opens 1 September | The Encouraging and Supporting Grassroots Activity (ESGA) 2023 Fund has £170,000 for groups and individuals in Scotland to run projects within their community supporting people affected by dementia. People looking to set up new projects, or those running already existing groups or activities, are welcome to apply for funding from £5,000 to £20,000 to cover a 12-month period. Collaborative bids considered. |
| GREEN JOBS CAPITAL FUND | | This fund helps businesses and social enterprises in the Highlands and Islands to create and preserve jobs that produce goods or services that benefit the environment. This could be by conserving natural resources, or creating more environmentally friendly processes in those organisations. For this fund, green jobs are considered (one of the following): jobs in businesses that provide goods or services that benefit the environment or conserve natural resources - for example, any job in a renewables or low carbon technology company, including warehouse and office staff, engineers and researchers jobs that focus on making an organisation's production processes more environmentally friendly or use fewer natural resources, either as their main focus or as part of a wider role - for example, a designated sustainability officer, or a purchasing manager who aims to source more sustainable materials and suppliers The funding is to be used only for capital expenditure to support these jobs. This can include spending on equipment, machinery, fixtures and fittings and information technology infrastructure. The application process has 2 stages. The first stage is to complete the online expression of interest form on the Highlands and Islands Enterprise website. There is no deadline for this. Your expression of interest form will be reviewed. If your application meets the basic criteria, you'll be allocated a development manager who will advise you on what you need to provide to make a stage 2 application. If your application is unsuccessful, Highlands and Islands Enterprise will explain why and will highlight other support options where possible. |

| HEAT NETWORK FUND: APPLICATION GUIDANCE | n/a | The Scottish Government is making £300 million available over the next parliamentary session to support the development and rollout of zero emission heat networks across Scotland.
