Applicant charities may assist with a wide range or specific groups of people, for example those living with mental ill health, cancer, physical and sensory impairments and long-term health conditions, as well as people with learning disabilities, autistic people, and other neurodivergent people. In addition, the Trust is particularly keen to receive grant applications from the following: smaller charities meeting a demonstrable 'need' from their local community causes that do not have a strong public profile, including new Scottish charities charities developing innovative approaches, including pilot projects The Trust operates two rounds of grants per calendar year: a Spring/Summer round – with applications submitted between early January to late February, and taken to the Board meeting in late May/ early June; an Autumn/Winter round – with applications submitted between late June to mid-August, and taken to the Board meeting in late November/early December.

BANK OF SCOTLAND FOUNDATION		Bank of Scotland Foundation, has announced the launch of its new five-year strategy - "Building a Brighter Future for Scotland." The strategy aims to fund, support and champion small and local charities that work towards improving the quality of life for some of Scotland's most vulnerable people.
		The first multi-year programme under the new strategy, Empower, will launch in early February, offering real security and certainty for charities. This programme will offer a three-year unrestricted grant of £150,000 (£50,000 per annum) and collaborating with Lloyds Banking Group, the Foundation also aims to identify opportunities to add strategic value for funded charities and help them grow stronger and thrive beyond the lifetime of their grant.
		Two further multi-year programmes will be launched later in the year. Energise is a multi-year grants programme supporting small and local charities that are closest to the real issues facing our communities. Available to new (and more established) charities this programme offers a two-year unrestricted grant of £20,000 (£10,000 per annum), enabling charities to use their grants in the way that helps them best.
		The third programme, Enable, is an innovative, joint grants programme with the Foundation's sole funder, Lloyds Banking Group, aimed at boosting community volunteering. Funding will be provided to charities to support projects delivered through volunteers, with Lloyds Banking Group's colleagues across Scotland volunteering their time and skills to help deliver the projects and support the charities. BUSINESS CHARGEPOINT FUNDING	To support the use of electric vehicles across Scotland, Transport Scotland offers grant funding to help organisations install electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure on their premises. The funding is distributed

		by Energy Saving Trust and is currently available for chargepoints that will only be used by occupiers, staff and visitors.
BUSINESS ENERGY SCOTLAND: SME LOAN SCHEME		Cashback grants of £20,000 and interest free loans up to £100,000 are available to charities, community organisations and social enterprises to install energy efficient systems, equipment or to upgrade building fabric such as energy efficient lighting. Free assessments are available.
CARES <u>LET'S DO NET</u> ZERO COMMUNITY BUILDINGS FUND	See guidance	Funding is now available from the Scottish Government's Community and Renewable Energy Scheme (CARES). The fund aims to support community organisations to reduce their building energy costs and carbon emissions. The Let's Do Net Zero Community Buildings Fund is open now and is planned to run until the end of March 2025, subject to funding availability. Funding is available for many types of community building, including: community cafes, community hubs, faith buildings, public halls, community halls and centres. Grant funding is available for up to 80% of eligible costs up to a maximum of £80,000. New guidance now available.
<u>CASH FOR KIDS -</u> <u>COST OF LIVING</u> <u>GRANTS</u>		Cash for Kids is supporting children and young people through the cost-of-living crisis, with £1.6 million available to support 32,200 children across the UK. In response to the crisis hitting so many families right now we've launched this new fund, to provide emergency essentials that support the physical and mental well-being of children who are struggling. These could include food, clothing and household energy costs, but we'll also consider anything that helps meet children's most basic needs. Grants are £50 per child per household, and we aim to get the funds to families as soon as possible.

They are particularly interested in programmes which show some creativity in improving the quality of life of older people. Up to £7,000.
CIRCULAR ECONOMY	N/A	This fund, administered by Zero Waste Scotland, offers investment to SMEs based in Scotland for work that will help to deliver circular economy growth.
CIRCULAR TEXTILES FUND		This fund supports the development of circular supply chains across the textiles industry in Scotland to help businesses achieve net zero carbon emissions. Zero Waste Scotland is administering the fund, which is backed by the Scottish Government, to help reduce the environmental impact of textiles.
CLIMATE ENGAGEMENT LAB – 2023 OPEN CALL FOR INNOVATION PARTNERSHIP		Climate Outreach is looking for a new innovation partner organisation to reach and motivate specific audiences in the UK. The <u>Climate Engagement Lab</u> is looking to support an existing project that is engaging people who are concerned about politics and climate change, but aren't generally part of the climate conversation and are deeply and instinctively distrustful that 'elites' will do much to help. Through the partnership, they will provide free support for a group that's engaging working class communities on climate or climate-adjacent (i.e. transport, energy, food) projects.
		The chosen partner will get support to apply evidence-backed insights to their project, along with up to £3,000 to cover the costs of participation.
COMMUNITY RIGHT TO BUY FUND		The Community Right to Buy Fund provides financial support for community organisations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. The fund helps communities pay for professional services to help them register an interest in land or buildings under the Community Right to Buy legislation. These services could include legal title searches or help with mapping. Funding of up to £5,000 is available, to cover up to 80% of the eligible cost. Communities must be prepared to cover the rest of the cost from other sources. This support is unlikely to involve state subsidy, but this will be assessed on a case by case basis.
CORRA FOUNDATION LOCAL SUPPORT FUND - NATIONAL DRUGS MISSION	Ongoing until funds are spent	The Local Support Fund (LSF) is for grassroots and community-based organisations in Scotland, which deliver frontline services to support people who use or used drugs, people who are in recovery and/or their families.
FUNDS		 To apply for this fund, you should meet the following criteria: You should have previously received funding through the Local Support Fund for one or two years. You should currently be delivering frontline services in Scotland, to support people who use drugs, people in recovery and/or their families.

		 You will require funding to stabilise or increase capacity, extend services and provide further reach into the community. Your organisation should have an annual income of up to £500,000. CORRA FOUNDATION - BOOST SMALL GRANTS		Boost small grants programme is for organisations supporting children and families in their local communities. It has been created to help groups that find the increases in basic running costs (for example utilities, salaries, transport) are making their work much more challenging. Boost will provide grants of £500-£3,000 to grassroots organisations and charities with a yearly income of up to £50,000 whose work benefits children and families. This fund aims to ensure accessible, supportive community-led activities remain available to children and families despite the challenges the cost of living poses for charities and community groups. Boost is delivered by Corra Foundation and is a partnership between the STV Children's Appeal and Corra Foundation.
	Initial enquiries invited before 19 March	The Way Forward for Families Partnership, a joint programme invested in by Corra Foundation and the Scottish Government, which will invite applications for funding from partnerships, led by third sector organisations working in partnership with public bodies, to deliver support to children, young people and families affected by alcohol and other drugs. The programme will distribute £615,000 in grants. Applicants can apply for up to £250,000 over three years and a minimum of 50% matched funding must be in place in each funding year. Decision-making he Way Forward for Families Fund will be led by a group of young people with lived experience of the impact of drugs and alcohol. THROUGHCARE GRANT FUND		Community Justice Scotland (CJS) has been conducting a review into the current operation and demand for voluntary throughcare services and in September 2023 provided the options and our recommendation to Scottish Ministers as to the scale and type of such services that the Scottish Government should grant fund in the future. After consideration, the Cabinet Secretary for Justice and Home Affairs has indicated her preference for a single, national throughcare and resettlement service provided through a partnership model to be commissioned. It is intended that this future service will commence from 2025/26 and the commissioning
		process will be led by CJS. The amount of grant funding available will be £5.3M, subject to Parliamentary approval of future budgets.
		The purpose of the grant fund is to establish a national partnership of voluntary sector organisations to provide throughcare support to people leaving prison after a prison sentence of less than four years or those leaving prison after a period of time spent on remand. The partnership will offer needs lead and person centred support to people leaving prison, and will provide an initial offer of resettlement support upon release from prison with the option of providing more intensive support to those who need it for up to 12 months. The support should be available to everyone leaving prison, regardless of age or gender, and should be available across all of Scotland.
		The current services provided by the Public Social Partnerships will continue to be provided until the new service is commenced.
		The CJS commissioning team are hosting a number of grant launch events throughout March to provide more detail on the grant process, answer any questions and facilitate partnering between third sector organisations.
